- Oldest known food bank in Kansas
- 67% increase in individuals being fed through the Weekly Grocery Program in 2022

- 5 handicapped accessible garden beds
 - 27 community garden
 raised beds
- A children's garden for neighborhood kids
- A Master Gardener's section raising produce for the Food Bank & running vegetable trails for K-State Extension



Live Well Saline County

- Began in 2009 as the Nutrition & Physical Activity Coalition of Salina.
- The primary goal was to engage community members to identify and create solutions to address barriers to eating healthy and being physically active.
- Initial core team members included Del Myers, Ellen Hogeland, Chris Curtis, and Daniel Craig.

- Received the 4-year Healthy Community Initiative (HCI) Grant from the Kansas Health Foundation in 2013.

- Received the 4-year Pathways to a Healthy Kansas grant from Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Kansas in 2020.



2017 Dane Hanson Strategic Doing

 Hosted by the Dane G. Hansen Foundation and the Greater Salina Community Foundation, there was a series of "Strategic Doing" meetings that guided Saline County residents through a quick and sophisticated process of prioritizing, planning and implementing (or "doing") community improvement projects.



Strategic Doing Overview

 Projects and ideas that were developed from these meetings were eligible to apply for funding from Dane G. Hansen Foundation Community grant fund at the Greater Salina Community Foundation or directly to the Hansen Foundation.



Local Foods Initiatives

• A variety of local foods topics were discussed including farmer's markets, CSA's, community gardens, and farm to school.

 The committee identified community gardens as the top priority and began discussing potential locations for a new community garden.



Be Patient and the Right Project Will Emerge

 After meeting with several organizations about starting new community gardens on their locations and identifying barriers including no water access the committee learned about the Salina Emergency Aid Food Bank community garden.



Improve on What You Already Have

- The Salina Emergency Aid Food Bank community garden already had all of the key elements including plenty of space, water access, and potential volunteers.
- The community garden project also helped to engage the Salina Emergency Aid Food Bank in the Live Well Saline County and they have been an active partner these past couple of years.

Year 1 Key Findings-Community Surveys

The survey was completed by 378 community members.

Key Finding #1: Survey respondents overwhelmingly identified more walking/biking trails as the number one improvement that could be made that would make it easier for them to be physically active.

Key Finding #2: Survey respondents said that having additional farmers markets and healthy restaurants would be the most important things Saline County could do to make it easier for residents and visitors to eat healthy.



Year 2 Key Findings-Community Surveys

The survey was completed by 520 community members and was offered in Spanish and English.

- Key Finding #1-Almost half of survey respondents identified cost as the key barrier to accessing food.
- Key Finding #2-Ten percent of survey respondents reported walking, biking, or taking public transit (bus) to shop for food and 82% of respondents used their own car for food shopping.



Community & Social Context

Placemaking Package

 \$45,288 grant to Salina Emergency Aid Food Bank for installation of four solar lights and development of a site plan and recommendations for improved parking access, lighting for the community garden and adjacent areas.








Neighborhood & Physical Environment

Multimodal Transportation and Recreational Trail Infrastructure

- The City of Salina received a \$100,000 grant through Pathways for sidewalk connectivity between the Salina Emergency Aid Food Bank, the Broadway business corridor, and South Street neighborhood, including links to OCCK bus stops.
- This project fit into the City of Salina "Sidewalk Gap Funding Decision Matrix." Prioritizes sidewalk development where: public safety risk, documented use by pedestrians, OCCK bus stop or route, and need to provide access to food outlets.








Planned Multimodal Projects in Salina by Socioeconomic Status

- The interviews were transcribed and we worked with the Kansas Health Institute to identify key barriers to accessing food at the Salina Emergency Aid Food Bank.



Year 3-Food Bank Client Interviews

Key Finding #1

The most frequently mentioned obstacles identified by clients who were interviewed that make it difficult to access the Salina Emergency Aid Food Bank's services were transportation and having to wait outside in the inclement weather.



Year 3-Food Bank Client Interviews

Key Finding #2

When asked about recommendations for changes to the Salina Emergency Aid Food Bank's space the clients we interviewed listed more parking and an expanded area with shelter for clients who are waiting for their food.



Year 3 Food Bank Client Interviews

Key Finding #3

Clients we interviewed identified having more produce available and offering healthier options as the key recommendations for changes to how the Salina Emergency Aid Food Bank distributes food.



Safe Routes to Food

\$100,000 Grant

- 12 additional parking stalls (one of which will be handicap accessible)
- 6 bike racks
- The total cost of the parking lot and other improvements is estimated to cost \$158,530. The Salina Emergency Aid Food Bank secured the remaining funding through local foundations and donors.

A listing of agencies and other resources where people can find food. The website will be an online tool that can be accessed by anyone at anytime.




Community Gardens
